HOW CAN A GOOD GOD EXIST WITH ALL THE SUFFERING IN THE WORLD?

We all have questions. We all wonder why things are the way they are. One of these is the question about the existence of evil and suffering. In other words, just because you don't see a good reason for how suffering can co-exist with a good God doesn't mean there isn't a good reason.

So, is there any reason at all to think that God is good while suffering still exists? Christianity's answer is yes. The coming of God into his broken yet beautiful world in the person of Jesus (the incarnation) to remove sins penalty and power on the cross (the atonement) proves that God truly cares and is not distant from the suffering that you and I experience. And Jesus' resurrection and ascension is the sign that one day God is going to return and destroy it completely. This means that even though you and I don't know all the reasons God has determined to allow sin and suffering to continue for a time, we know what the reason isn't; it isn't because he doesn't love us or doesn't care.

He takes a mess and turns it into a masterpiece. This is the God that Christianity offers this suffering world.
